GRANTS PASS BOY WINS EDUCATIONAL HONORS

Reports have come to Grants Pass from time to time of the good work of Mathew Riddle, son of Mr. and Mrs. George R. Riddle, now in France with Base Hospital unit No. 46. Captain Benson, M. D., of that unit while in Portland recently, reported that young Riddle, who is a '17 graduate of Reed College, had been promoted to the head of the main or central laboratory, which is the center of a group of seven hospitals, each having a small local laboratory.

After a survey of the men in the several groups Mr. Riddle was last fall sent to the University of Dijon for a special five weeks' course, and upon his return to the unit was given charge of the preparation room.

On March 5 he was notified of his assignment to the University of Montpellier, a university established in the 11th century and which is today recognized as one of the intellectual centers of France. This university specializes in medicine, exact sciences and physical science.

Previous to the signing of the armistice young Riddle had been recommended for a commission.

"KAISER'S" RAPID GROWTH ASTONISHES

L. A. Robertson has a Victory pig which he has been feeding plentifully and watching the growth of since January 4. Not only that, but Mr. Robertson has been weighing the animal every Sunday since February 24 in order to note its gain. The figures give a startling record, which Mr. Robertson declares is the absolute truth.

The pig is a Duroc Jersey, purchased from "Mitch" of Murphy January 4, and weight at that time about 30 pounds. On February 23 the weight was 100 pounds, and on each subsequent Sunday the weights were: 111 lbs., 123 lbs., 139 lbs., 145 lbs., 163 lbs., 175 lbs., and on April 13 the weight was 196 lbs., showing a gain of 21 pounds in the week.

Although Mr. Robertson calls this his victory pig he named the animal the "Kaiser," anticipating the time of slaughter.

ADOBE HOUSES FOR UNITED STATES ARMY

El Paso, Tex., Apr. 16.—The United States army on the border has taken a leaf from the Mexican's book of living. The new Seventh Cavalry cantonment which is to be built on the Fort Bliss reservation will be constructed of adobe blocks like those used throughout Mexico for home building. The adobe is recognized in the southwest as an ideal construction material—warm in winter and cool in summer. Colonel John A. Wagner, district quartermaster, sent the officers of his staff to Juarez to study adobe construction and this knowledge will be applied to the construction of the new cantonment. The adobe houses and barracks will be plastered both inside and out.

8TH U.S. CAVALRY HAD LIVELY YEAR AND HALF

Marfa, Tex., Apr. 16.—After a year and a half of history making service guarding the Big Bend border of Texas, the Eighth United States cavalry has been ordered to return to Fort Bliss, Texas, where the regiment was stationed in the permanent post prior to marching to Marfa for duty in the Big Bend.

During the time the cavalry command has been patrolling the great reaches of sand waste and cañons, a battle has been fought at Ojinaga, opposite Presidio, Tex., many raids across the border have been made and punitive expeditions followed these into Mexico and killed many of the bandits. The most recent one was the Ruidosa raid on the Nunez ranch March 22nd when Captain Klopfer's troop M pursued and killed five cattle thieves.
