HAWLEY WOULD FORCE PEACE

ing itself under steadily declining market. A reduction in the burden of taxation is necessary, or possibly I should say, a redistribution of the burden. This can in my judgment, be more effectively and equitably accomplished by the levy of duties upon imports in connection with a readjustment of the immense taxes. The amount received on imports now is insignificant. There should be collected a billion or a billion and a quarter in revenue at the ports of entry. The United States will be the premier market of the world for many years and if we do not provide for the protection of our labor and industries this country will become a dumping ground for the products of various other nations seeking markets for goods made by cheaper labor working under inferior conditions. I am of the opinion that revenue legislation will be one of the first matters to be considered.

"The most insistent question before the American people at this time is the settlement with our enemies. It seems to me that the situation would have been simplified had the delegates in Paris first devoted their attention to the terms of the peace to be offered to the central allies, and having determined upon the terms they would offer, to have said to the central allies, 'There are the terms of settlement, you can either accept or we will enforce them upon you.' After having done this it would have been possible then to have taken up the question of a league of nations unimpeded by the difficulties incident to settlement of the peace terms. I believe the people of the United States are in favor of a sensible, effective and workable league of nations that will leave to each nation the settlement of its own domestic policies and questions and confine itself to the international relations of the state which become members of the league; except of course, the league would always be observant of the actions of the several nations to see that they did not secretly or openly plan war. I favor the best league that can be formed. The draft presented to the delegates in Versailles in February is defective in many respects. It does not provide how the executive council shall vote, whether by a majority, or by a two thirds majority; how the members shall be selected, or how a question shall be adjusted in case the executive council is unable to agree; it provides that the executive council can interfere in the domestic affairs of the members of the league, and I do not believe any other nation can manage our affairs better than we can ourselves; it also does not guarantee the continuance of the Monroe Doctrine. There are

other matters that require amendment, and the fact that agreements have been made to amend the original draft indicates that the discussion has been productive of good. We ought to take sufficient time to draft for the league the best possible constitution that the wisdom of man can devise, for it will be subjected to enormous strains from time to time, and to be of any permanent value it must be able to successfully emerge from them."

Mr. Hawley will remain in Grants Pass until Thursday morning, when he leaves for Roseburg.
