Berlin, Apr. 24.—The Lokal Anzeiger's Vienna correspondent says the Hungarian soviet government requested the entente mission, through a Hungarian diplomat in Vienna, to send delegates to Budapest to negotiate an armistice with the Roumanians.

"Colonel Cunningham, representing the allies, after communicating with Paris," says the newspaper, "had the Hungarian government informed that the entente was ready to conclude an armistice and immediately suspend the advance of its troops if the soviet government would abdicate."
