most familiar with traffic conditions 740 Tenth street, phone 211-Y. 55 and with the financial requirements of the railroads approximate this increase at from 15 to 25 per cent over and above the present rates.

Administration officials deny any intention to raise the rates. They have denied this possibility repeatedly, but schedules of new rates have been prepared and are now before the director general for his consideration. He may decline now to order an increase, as he has heretofore, but between now and early fall it is predicted by the most expert students of transportation that freight rates will be increased.

They point out that before the oads are returned to private ownership and operation, the roads must be prepared to earn the standard return without the government being called upn to supply deficits between earnings and standard return from general taxes.

All agree that the \$1,000,000,000 in additional wages is a permanent burden that cannot be reduced now if ever, and they are equally positive that failure to earn the return cannot permanently be cured by resort to appropriations from taxpayers' money.
