MRS. HALL DIES AFTER YEARS OF SUFFERING

Maggie Elizabeth Hall died at her residence, 649 North Fourth street, at 2:30 p. m. May 5, 1919, aged 53 years 10 months 11 days. She was born June 24, 1865, in Mechanicsburg, Ill., where she resided with her parents until October 4th, 1887, when she was united in marriage to L. B. Hall and to that union was born four children, Byron L. and Mabel, who died in Illinois, Mrs. O. S. Goodnow, of Sacramento, Cal., and Andrew, high school student in this city, the latter two being at her bed side at the last. Mrs. Hall with her family moved to Grants Pass in 1905 and resided here until the time of her death.

Mrs. Hall united with the Methodist Episcopal church in 1877, serving as organist over 20 years, was active in Sunday school, missionary and ladies aid societies until her health failed. She seldom missed a church service during the active years of her life. Beside the members of her family here, she leaves to mourn her loss a sister, Mrs. Laura B. Fullenwider, of Mechanicsburg, Ill.

Deceased was a member of the Eastern Star and Royal Neighbors of this city.

She came to her death by exhaustion from chronic rheumatism. She had been an intense sufferer for some years before her death; every hour brought its burden of pain, the extent of which was hardly realized even among those who knew her well. Her bravery and cheerfulness were remarkable.

The funeral services will be conducted from the residence Wednesday afternoon, May 7, at 3 o'clock by Rev. Melville T. Wire. The remains will be taken to the Portland Crematorium.

GRANTS PASS BRASS BAND IS ORGANIZED

A committee from the local Chamber of Commerce met with the band boys last night at the Chamber of Commerce rooms and organized a band, to be known as the Grants Pass Brass Band. The following officers were elected: Dr. E. C. Macy, president; Joe Wharton, vice president; Arthur Wible, secretary, and Roscoe Bratton, treasurer.

On the election of a treasurer there was a spirited contest, it having been suggested that the Chamber of Commerce, inasmuch as it financed the movement, act in that capacity. Roscoe Bratton was nominated and won out over the commercial organization by a vote of almost two to one.
