COAST ROAD BADLY NEEDED

us 50-50. And of course if they finish the road the government will maintain it for all time to come without putting the expense on the state of Oregon. With this in view they have already appropriated \$400,000 for an artillery school at Corvallis."

"The first thought is to finish the Pacific highway; then the Roosevelt highway, giving two great roadways from the British Columbia line to the Mexican line, and the building of laterals between the two lines, which is a natural sequence wherever trunk lines have been built, would mean the immediate development of this country, and the only way in which a mountainous country like ours can be developed."

The proposition of voting bonds for the Roosevelt military highway will be on the ballot at the June 3 special election. It provides a bond issue of \$2,500,000, which when matched with the government's appropriation will provide a fund of \$5,000,000 for the building of a highway from Astoria through Clatsop, Lincoln, Lane, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties to the California state line.

It is estimated that the proposed road will open a territory which will add to the tax rolls, and that the sums secured as taxes will provide for the bond issue. The highway system of California has been responsible for a great part of that state's prosperity. It is estimated that 20 per cent of tourists in California become investors, and thus the good roads which invite tourists are directly responsible for vast investments. California will vote on a total of \$40,000,000 for roads; Washington will vote on about \$25,000,000 and Oregon will vote on \$5,000,000, this five million to provide absolutely needed trunk highway.

son. Will you please tell me if he left any word for us?"

"Please let me know what you can about the death of my brother. The last letter we received from him said he was in a hospital suffering typhoid. Next came the war department telegram telling that he was killed in action."

The answers read as follows.

"Your son was shot in the stomach by German snipers half way between the villages of Very and Eclisfontaine."

"Your brother was killed on the night of November 1 about the center of the town of Waeroghan, Belgium. German airplanes had appeared over the town and had forced the people to hide for safety. As your brother with several other soldiers was descending into a cellar a bomb struck nearby and threw him against the wall, killing him instantly."

In cases where one shell killed several men, Lieutenant Dymont bunches the deaths and describes all in one letter. Copies of the letter go to relatives of each of the men.

No facts, no matter how bad, are withheld. Recently the lieutenant had to write the Washington father of a boy who was so badly wounded that his comrades did not dare move him and had to leave him behind to die when they changed their position.

Lieutenant Dymont estimates that the Ninety-First suffered about 5,000 casualties. Of this number, between 1,400 and 1,500 were fatalities.

With every letter, Lieutenant Dymont sends a short sketch of the history of the fighting of the Ninety-First so that those who have lost relatives may, with the aid of a good map trace the principal movements of the division.

Lieutenant Dymont this summer will resume his duties as head of the journalism department of the University of Washington. Before coming to Washington he was the head of the journalism department of the University of Oregon.
