SOLD EVERYWHERE

PAMPERED ANIMALS DIED FROM EXPOSURE

Paris, May 23.—One hundred animals in the Paris zoological gardens died during the war. After a bomb from a German airplane made a big hole in the Rue Cuvier, alongside the gardens, the authorities thought it wise to kill the poisonous snakes, lest they should escape and cause a panic.

Later the river Seine overflowed its banks and flooded part of the gardens, and monkeys, antelopes and giraffes developed chest complaints and died. Only the water fowl flourished, but Coco, the baby hippo, the pride of the gardens died of ennui, they say as the birds were virtually deserted during the war.

ONE BLOW OF HAMMER 16 NATIVES KILLED

Seattle, May 23.—German charts recently surrendered disclosed the existence in the China sea of a large mine field over which American steamships, ignorant of its existence, passed safely many times. Captain J. E. Guphill, master of the Pacific Steamship company's passenger vessel Senator said here today.

The "Senator," the captain asserted passed nine times over the field before it was discovered. The German raider Wolfe, in September, 1917, laid the mines in a field 60 miles long by two wide, but set them too deep to do any damage.

Chinese trawlers, commanded by British officers, are removing the mines, Captain Guphill asserted. One mine floated ashore on an island in the China sea. Sixteen Malay islanders found the mine and started to break it up to obtain the copper. One blow was struck. The mine exploded and killed the 16.

HOW TO CAN RHUBARB

Because of its extreme acidity, rhubarb can be canned safely without boiling (processing). Rhubarb should not be canned in ordinary metal or in jars with ordinary metal tops. Only glass or cans specially enameled inside may be used.

Select young, tender rhubarb and cut either into two-inch pieces or into lengths to fit the jar when placed vertically. Pack in sterilized jars in vertical rows. Cover with fresh cold water and allow jars to stand ten minutes. Drain off the water and again fill to overflowing with fresh cold water. Use cleansed rubber, put on glass cap and clamp at once. In the far South rhubarb should be boiled (processed) in a hot-water bath (pints ten minutes, quarts 20 minutes) at boiling.

Since rhubarb contains much water, a better and more economical product could be secured by canning rhubarb sauce. Cut the rhubarb into one-inch lengths and steam until tender. For each quart of sauce add half a cupful of sugar. Pack hot in sterilized jars. Partially seal. Boil (process) quarts for ten minutes. When jars are cold, test for leaks. Store in a cool, dark, dry place.—United States Department of Agriculture.
