ALFALFA AND FRUIT

drop will take so little of the fruit that it will have no effect on the crop and one will be unable to get his work done. Get your thinners busy now.

Over the County

Haying season is now on and most farmers are busy cutting the first crop of alfalfa. In a good many cases the first crop is already harvested. The very dry, warm weather has hastened the maturing of the crop which generally is not quite up to normal yield. The wet weather during the early spring was very favorable to the growth of weeds and as a consequence the quality is a little below the standard in many cases.

W. H. Leonard, just below Grants Pass, had an excellent crop of sweet clover which he harvested for hay. This was taken-off some two weeks ago. Mr. Leonard says his stock will eat it too.

Corn

A considerably increased acreage of corn has been planted this year—perhaps 20 per cent more than normal. A few more silos are to be built and a great many farmers attracted by the high prices received for hogs are planning to have some corn for fattening some hogs this fall. Corn planting is just about finished. Apparently more care has been given to the preparation of the seed bed for corn this year than common.

Spraying

It is getting time to be ready for the 30-day spray. The warm weather of the past few days is beginning to bring out the codlin moth—while but few are coming out it is very important to head these few off right at the beginning. If it were possible to get all of the first hatch killed off there would be but little need of later sprays. For the control of the moth from now on the next two sprays are the all important ones of the season. Above all thoroughness and high pressure are the essential features of the work.
