## MINIMUM WAGE \$13.20 FOR WOMEN APPROVED

Portland, June 18.—An informal expression of the industrial welfare conference approves a minimum wage of \$13.20 a week for experienced adult women, a 48-hour week, with a maximum of nine hours a day and one day's rest in seven. Formal vote on the matter will not be taken by the conference until after consideration has been given the written statement of the hotelmen of the city, which will be submitted Thursday, according to R. W. Price, president of the State Hotelmen's association. Next meeting of the conference is set for Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Employment of women ushers in theaters, in elevators, in cigar stands, in hotel lobbies and as "demonstrators of sheet music," after 6 o'clock will be considered at the next meeting of the conference, according to the announcement of Bishop Walter T. Sumner, chairman of the conference. Some relief for student nurses in hospitals, who now work 10 and 12 hours a day in addition to attending classes at night, will also be considered in the near future.

"Thousands of dollars are spent yearly in dressing up these girl ushers in theaters like peacocks—and other things," said Bishop Sumner, while vigorous approval was given by other members of the conference. "Their hours keep them out late at night, and altogether it is not the place for a young girl. Besides, these positions would be splendid for returned soldiers, especially those who have been injured to such an extent as to make heavy work impossible."

## CONSTABLE STEALS MONEY FROM BANDITS

Roseburg, June 18.—S. A. Krummer, deputy constable, Mike Zelock, ex-convict, alleged bootlegger and gangster, Claude Bennett, chauffeur, John Kalis, robber and an unidentified man, captured at Drain, are all in the toils of the law and charged with being implicated in the most exciting robbery to be committed in Douglas county for many years.

Of those arrested three are wounded. Zelock, the leader of the gang, has the wounds of 38 bird shots in his back and a 30-30 bullet wound through his leg. Kalis has 13 shot wounds in his back and the unidentified robber has a gunshot wound over the right eye. The first named is the most seriously injured and is confined to the Mercy hospital. Krummer, was sworn in as deputy constable by the Scottsburg justice of the peace and is alleged to have stolen the money after it was dropped by the robbers. Over \$750 was found in his possession and the remainder of the sum of \$1,980 has not been located.

## ZAPATA'S FRIENDS CARRY ON CAMPAIGN

Chautla, Morelos, June 17.—There is no lack of candidates to carry out the work of the late Emiliano Zapata, recently killed by the forces of General Pablo Gonzalez. Among them in Fortino Ayaquila, an outlaw chieftain, who, in a manifesto which has fallen into the hands of the federal authorities, proclaims himself the worthy successor to the late "Attila of the South," if not for the reason that he was one of the stagers of the Plan of Ayala which started the Zapatista movement in 1910, then because he is Zapata's nephew.
