A certain bulk is necessary in the grain mixture given to the dairy cow to obtain the best results. When heavy feeds are used, some bulky ones should be included to lighten the mixture, since it is probable that a certain degree of bulkiness aids digestion. Some

that are appetizing. In making the grain mixture care quantity of either constipating or laxative feed is not included. Cottonseed meal, for example, is decidedly constipating and should be fed with laxative grains or succulents, such as silage or roots. For ordinary feeding in most parts of the United States not more than one-third of the grain should be cottonseed meal. In some sections larger quantities have been fed, but this practice is not be recommended. On the other hand, linseed-oil meal, because of its distinctly laxative action, should not be fed ordinarily in greater quantities than 11/2 pounds a
