marvels. The petrified forest where the forest cast in stone has been done by patient nature drop by drop as the water has trickled through the marble, washing out the lime stone. One of the wonders which must not escape notice is the stream of ice cold lime water, which gurgles and rushes through the depths below, and finally emerges at the lower entrance. A cup of this lime water is as invigorating as our late lamented beverage, medicine and friend.

Three hours and a half of wonderland, safely conducted by Guide Rowley, a man who feels the honor which has been accorded him in placing him in charge of this masterpiece of nature. This trip should not be attempted without a guide as falls are possible for the unexperienced. The Devil's cauldron, pictured in the weird light, by the guide becomes real and the prehistoric skeleton of gigantic beasts, need only his suggestion to clothe them in their former greatness. The Queen's palace, Joaquin Millers' chapel, Twin Sisters, Paradise Lost, Washington Monument, Bee Hive, Graveyard and the tunnels and passages between, make a journey never to be forgotten.

A playground provided for the people, grand in its majesty of nature's building which costs nothing but a pleasant trip to see, and yet only a small percentage of Oregonians have seen the caves, even some living closest having failed in accepting their opportunities.

No provisions are made at the caves for caring for tourists in the way of housing, and camping equipment must be carried in if a longer stay than one day is intended. 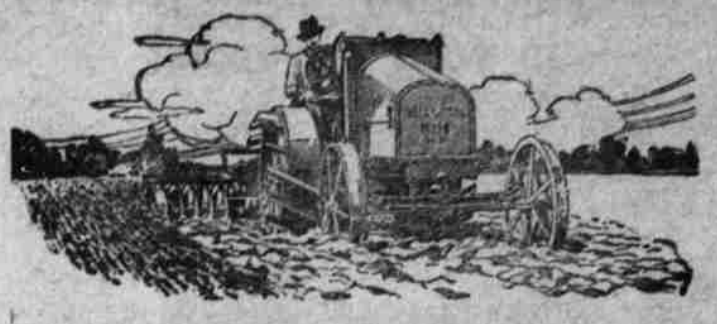
