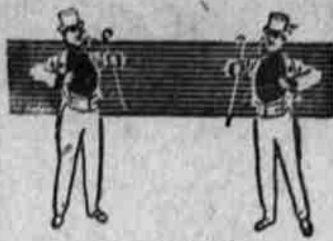

CLOTHING RETURNED TO DISCHARGED SOLDIERS

Editor Courier:

The war department has issued an order, granting to our heroic soldiers who served in and won the great war uniforms, clothing, personal effects, and equipment, on proper application therefor. They are also entitled to the "Victory Button."

It may be that there are soldiers among your readers who have not availed themselves in whole or in part, of this order, and who are in doubt as to how to proceed to obtain them. Knowing your great interest in them, it has occurred to me that you would take pleasure in bringing this opportunity to their attention through the columns of your valuable paper, and so render them a further service which I am sure they will appreciate.

They are entitled to receive these articles upon discharge. I am reliably informed that not one in ten has received them, at least not all of them. I am inclosing a list of the articles, which you may wish to print.

If any soldier will write me I will send him information and the application. While this is not necessary in order to secure the articles, it will expedite action, and I shall be glad to serve them.

The following articles of clothing and equipment may be permanently retained by enlisted men upon honorable discharge:

- 1 overseas cap (for all enlisted men who have had service overseas) or 1 hat and 1 hat cord for all other enlisted men.
- 1 olive drab shirt.
- 1 service coat and ornaments.
- 1 pair breeches.
- 1 pair shoes.
- 1 pair leggings.
- 1 waist belt.
- 1 slicker.
- 1 overcoat.
- 2 suits underwear.
- 1 pair stockings.
- 1 pair gloves.
- 1 gas mask and helmet (if issued overseas).
- 1 set toilet articles, (if in possession when discharged).
- 1 barrack bag.
- 3 scarlet chevrons.

LABOR DAY TO LAUNCH AMERICAN LABOR PARTY

Cleveland, Ohio, July 28.—Delegates from ten states representing more than 2,000,000 organized workers will meet here after Labor day to organize the American Labor party. It has been announced by local proponents of the movement. The convention may also decide whether to nominate a national ticket in 1920.

An effort will be made to insert a plank in the platform calling for the repeal of the federal prohibition amendment, it is said. Other policies to be included in the platform may follow recommendations in resolutions adopted by the American Federation of Labor convention.

Delegates from Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Washington, Oregon, Montana, New York and Ohio are expected to attend the convention.

and specially built for long flight. This reduced their efficiency and while they had moral effect their military value was small. Because of their permanent position their location was discovered by allied aviators and the guns silenced. The German 15-inch gun in Flanders also became famous for its long range bombardment of Dunkirk and other allied bases, but neither could be shifted from base to base without delay of weeks. The American 14-inch gun could move from one end of France to another and had a range of 30 miles. At a range of 22,000 yards it pierces armor successfully.

ONE MILLION DOLLARS OFFERED FOR INVENTION

Menominee, Mich., July 28.—One million dollars was refused here today by Marshall B. Lloyd for his new method of producing reed and fiber goods and his machine for weaving the fabrics.

A group of American men interested in the manufacture of baby carriages, furniture and baskets, inspected the device in Mr. Lloyd's factory and saw for the first time in the history of the world, a machine that would weave reed and fiber. Up to the present time this costly operation has been done by hand. The Lloyd Loom, however, will weave the fabric 30 times as fast as the most expert hand worker can and with far greater superiority.

A "jack pot" of \$1,000,000 was made up by the manufacturers during the noon hour and offered Mr. Lloyd. He turned it down. A short while ago the Australian government purchased rights to Mr. Lloyd's inventions for \$250,000 in order to give industrial assistance to returned wounded soldiers. The sight of a one armed man operating the machine in the Lloyd plant here convinced the Hon. G. M. S. Manifold member of the Australian parliament that his country needed the machine to help out its returned and crippled heroes.
