## AIRPLANE FLIGHTS CONTINUING TODAY

The Curtiss plane which made regular flights from the local landing field yesterday is still the big attraction today. The machine was busy yesterday until dark except from 3 to 7 p. m. when the wind was too heavy for complete safety. Flith, Miss Alma Wolke, Fred Hyde of Murphy, Mrs. Robert Leadbetter, Miss Helen Layton, Miss Leah Slover, A. E. Voorhies, H. P. Egger, Mrs. John Denison and C. H. Corson. Mrs. Denison made by far the highest flight of the day, reaching an elevation of nearly 3500 feet. About 1500 feet was the average height attained. In all 20 flights were made during the day.

Only three flights were made this morning, Mrs. August Goettsche being the first and making the highest flight yet, 4,000 feet. Mrs. Goettsche says she signaled the pilot to go higher and he did, but not as high as she would have been willing to go. She said she wanted to go clear out of sight.

Additional flights will be made this evening commencing at 6:45 and continuing until dark.
