Los Angeles, Aug. 5.—A relic of their barbaric past, yet such a part of their tribal existence that it cannot be discarded, the annual snake dance of the Hopi Indians will be held this year August 20 and September 6, at the Hopi Indian reservation in Eastern Arizona, according to an announcement made here recently.

20-YEAR SEARCH FOR HIDDEN GOLD MINE

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 5.—Continuing a 10-year search for a rich gold mine, C. H. Roff recently left this city for the upper reaches of Salmon river in northern Idaho. For two decades ever since he received, from the death bed of one of the discoverers of the mine, directions for its location, Roff has been spending the greater part of his summers in the search of the Salmon river country, in a search, thus far vain, for the treasure.

For many years James Hughes and a partner, whose name now is unknown, left this city each spring by devious trails. Each fall they returned with a goodly quantity of gold dust and nuggets. So carefully did they guard the secret of the source of their wealth that it never was discovered.

The vein, while narrow, was so rich in gold, according to Hughes' story, that he and his partner simply pounded out the precious metal with a pestle in a little iron mortar, and then washed, panned and sacked it. If Roff can locate it, he believes he will be well repaid for his 20 years' search.

"WESTERN MEN" FOR THE PACIFIC FLEET

San Francisco, Aug. 4.—"Man the Pacific fleet with Western men," will be the slogan of the intensive recruiting campaign to be launched at every port visited by the fleet upon its arrival on this coast.

Men will be enlisted at war time pay for two, three or four year terms. The shorter term is expected to be especially attractive to young boys just completing their schooling. To these and all who enlist will be given opportunity it has been announced to choose the ship they wish to join. Cruises to many ports in the Pacific at frequent intervals also is expected to lure many.

Manning the ships with western men also, it was said, will tend to keep individual ships permanently stationed in Western waters, as the desire of the men and officers will be to have their ships' bases at home ports.

Washington, Aug. 4.—Passage of the Mondell bill involving Secretary Lane's project for farms for soldiers and sailors was recommended in a report submitted to the house today by Representative Sinnott, republican, Oregon, chairman of the public lands committee. The measure carries an appropriation of \$500,000,000 and was reported after exhaustive hearings had been held.

PREDICTS DESPAIR AND RAGE ALL OVER EUROPE

Lucerne, Switzerland, Aug. 5.—Before the winter sets in there will be a "terrible spasm of rage and despair among the peoples of Europe in which the final remains of civilization may be totally annihilated," it was predicted by Arthur Henderson, British labor leader, at the opening session of the international socialist conference here yesterday.

The remarks of Mr. Henderson followed those of Otto Weils, of the majority element of the German socialists, who declared German workmen expected from the president of the United States the creation of a real league of nations. He characterized the league organized in Paris without Germany and Russia, as a "mere pleasantries."

In alluding to the peace treaty Mr. Henderson declared the principal points of it ought to be subjected to immediate and thorough revision.

Condemnation of support of Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian government at Omsk, by the entente nations, was expressed by James Ramsay MacDonald of the British delegation and Marcel Cachin the French socialist leader. Both the speakers demanded that an energetic attitude be adopted by the socialists toward the nations, particularly on this ground.

Emil Vandervelde, Belgian socialist, gave his opinion that it would be impossible to reconstitute the international socialist organization until the war responsibilities was settled.
