

DISCHARGED SERVICE MEN TO GET AID

Districts Named Where War Risk Insurance Beneficiaries May Be Treated.

Organization of fourteen medical disricts, where discharged soldiers, sailors and marines who are beneficiaries of the war-risk insurance act may obtain necessary treatment, was announced by Surgeon General Ireland. The districts will be under the supervision of the public health service, and a bealth officer will be in charge at each headquarters.
