Improve South Sixth—

Work is to be completed not later than the first of next January, but the city reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

Revisit Grants Pass—
Dr. and Mrs. T. Morse of Chicago, who visited here 12 years ago, and who are now on their way north, are spending the day in town to see how much Grants Pass has improved since their last trip through here.

Revival of Chrome Shipments—
The chrome industry does not seem to be entirely dead in this vicinity, according to R. J. Rowen of this city who has just been appointed purchasing agent for a number of eastern consumers who are ready to take about 1500 tons of local chrome at prices about the same as prevailed before the war. It is generally understood that there are several hundred tons already mined at the various properties and thus immediately available and it will be welcome news to the miners that there is again an outlet for their product. The shipments are understood as going to points in Ohio and Illinois where some of the consumers are not overstocked, as are those who bought so heavily during the big market of last year. Most of the deposits opened up in Southern Oregon can be moved at a profit, says Mr. Rowen.
