OBITUARY

Gall Armour Hamilton

Gall Armour Hamilton was born at Park Place, Oregon, December 21, 1892, where he spent his early boyhood days, excepting one year which the family spent in the Yukon Territory.

In 1907 the family removed to Grants Pass and settled in their present home in Fruitdale, where Gall attended the district school. In 1914 he graduated from the Grants Pass High school. He was an ambitious student and an enthusiast in all athletic sports; he also took an active part in glee club showing much talent in music and dramatic work.

Having a keen desire for a professional career, he entered the North Pacific Dental College in 1916. A severe illness the following summer, from which he did not sufficiently recover, prevented him from continuing his studies the ensuing year, but with characteristic perseverance he returned to the college in the fall of 1918, where a little later he was enrolled in the student army training corps, having successfully passed the physical examination for the service.

Early in December he contracted the Spanish influenza followed by pneumonia. After weeks of illness he returned to his home where loving hands of parents and friends strove to win him back to health and strength, with no avail. At length following his physician's advice and his own desires, he journeyed to Phoenix, Arizona, where it was hoped the change would cure him. For the past month his letters have spoken of his steady improvement, so that the sudden news of his death came as a double shock to the entire community.

He was cheerful and uncomplaining during his long season of misfortune. His was an exemplary, Christian character, and his early death casts a shadow over every home who knew him. He is survived by his parents, Geo. A. and Jessie C. Hamilton, and two brothers, Worth, who is still in France, and Glen, who resides with his parents at Fruitdale.
