A. R. C. GIVES QUEEN LATEST STYLE HOSPITAL

Bucharest, Sept. 9.—Roumanian and Hungarian wounded in the recent fighting around Budapest have been treated in an American mobile hospital of the most modern type—the last word in war hospitals for use in the field with a rapidly moving army.

The type of mobile hospital being used is that known as the "auto-chair." It is a hospital on wheels—15 huge automobile trucks equipped with everything needed for war-time medicine and surgery. There are automobile operating rooms, automobile sterilizing equipment, an automobile laboratory, a pure water machine with ice-making attachment, an X-ray car, electric light plant, steam heating plant, a blacksmith's repair shop and a complete tent hospital which can be set up anywhere in about two hours, so as to accommodate about 200 men, who have been wounded.

The hospital is a gift from the American Red Cross to Queen Marie of Roumania.

SALOON FIXTURES USED FOR COFFINS

Los Angeles, Sept. 9.—The saloon bars, both brass and mahogany, are being used to make coffins, it became known recently when a wrecking company purchased several mahogany bars and their brass trimmings from saloons which closed on account of prohibition. The scarcity of mahogany caused the wrecking of the bars, the company said, and the lumber is sold to casket makers. The brass trimmings are cast into handles plated with silver and attached to the caskets.
