## FOX FARM PRODUCES \$55,000 IN HIDES

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 17.—Growth of a fox farm industry on Kukoi Island, off the coast of Alaska, from ten pairs of foxes to a band of an estimated value of \$130,000 in the last four years was described by Claude Green, formerly a trapper, prospector and miner of the Coeur d'Alene district of Idaho, and one of the proprietors of the farm, during a recent visit here.  
 The fox are fed a cooked mash of fish and shorts. The farm maintains its own fishing fleet, and yearly dries 20,000 humpback and dog salmon, Mr. Green said.  
 Orders on hand for foxes for breeding purposes now total \$16,000, he declared, and \$55,000 worth of hides will be sold during the present year. The farm was started with eight pairs of blue foxes and two pairs of silver foxes. More than 600 foxes, with an average market value per pelt of \$185, have been raised, according to Mr. Green.
