CHENOWETH SPRINGS SENSATION AT TRIAL

Marshallfield, Sept. 18.—A sensation was sprung in the trial of George Chenoweth, former county commissioner and a veteran of the Canadian army in France, charged with murdering George Sydam, when on the witness stand he declared he was not insane at the time of the killing.

Dr. Williamson, an alienist employed by the defense, testified that there was not the slightest doubt but that Chenoweth was insane when he walked up to young Sydam and shot him at the dance near Langlois. The strain of the worry about his daughter's condition, added to the mental and physical strain that Chenoweth went through during the war, were almost certain to produce mental derangement, Dr. Williamson declared. Several more doctors are to be called by the defense.

The defense will occupy this week and probably next.
