most existing and would hinder the outbreak of further trouble. I am not insane," he continued, "and I believe my attorneys will soon prove this. I do not believe I will be kept in the institution six months."

Asked about the manifestation of enmity toward him on the part of many of the residents of the county, Mr. Chenoweth explained:

"For six months, following the killing I was kept in jail, my family as well as myself being instructed by my attorneys not to discuss the case. In that time, the family of George Sydnam spread their propaganda and in some measure succeeded in embittering the community. We were at a disadvantage, for we were constrained to keep silence."

## 38,000 INSTRUCTORS NEEDED IN U. S. PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Washington, Sept. 26.—The public schools of the nation began the new school year with a shortage of approximately 38,000 teachers. This estimate was made today by the National Education association on the basis of questionnaires sent to 3465 district and county school superintendents in all states.
