Grants Pass Beats Ashland—Grants Pass, with eyes on the southern Oregon championship, Saturday defeated the Ashland high, 26 to 0. The heavy Grants Pass backfield proved too much for Ashland's line. The game was marked by very rough playing and frequent penalties, Grants Pass being the worst offender.

Three Lizzies Wrecked—Three Fords were wrecked here about 5 o'clock Sunday morning at the Southern Pacific crossing on Sixth street in one, two, three order. The occupants of the machines were returning from the Murphy dance and went north on Sixth street. When they returned the machines crashed into a flat car which had been left by the train crew extending into the street. The pavement was wet and the flat car was almost invisible as the machine lights hit the pavement underneath the car. No one was hurt.

SEVEN COUNTIES OVER TOP—ROOSEVELT MEMORIAL DRIVE. Portland, Ore., Oct. 25.—Wallowa and Gilliam counties have reported their quotas raised in full in the Roosevelt memorial campaign today. This makes seven counties in the state that have gone over the top and several other counties are expected to complete their quotas by tonight. Multnomah county is speeding up and will probably go over the top by midnight. A vigorous campaign is being made by leaders in Portland's financial, civic, industrial and business life.

GERMAN SOLDIERS AWAIT THE "BIG MAN"

Berlin, Oct. 27.—Lieutenant-General Albrecht, formerly commander of the border defense troops in the northeast advised the officers of his command on the occasion of their demobilization, to go to work in the mines or on the farms.
