HERO WHO FIRED FIRST SHOT CRITICALLY ILL

Osborne DeVarila returned home Saturday morning from the U. S. general hospital at Denver, where he has been a patient for several months. He was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Clara DeVarila, who has been with him for several months, by Lieutenant James, of the medical staff, and Private Butler. Young DeVarila has been confined to his bed for more than two months. He feels more at home in Grants Pass and wanted to be here at the home of his grandmother, Mrs. John Pool, so he was released from the hospital. His condition is such that visitors are not received.

Osborne DeVarila enlisted in Grants Pass in April, 1917, and was soon promoted to corporal. He arrived in France September 5, as a member of Battery C, 6th field artillery, which fired the first schrapnel for the United States against Germany. He was gassed and returned to the United States. Later he was returned to France and was again gassed on his second day in action.
