SMALL CHANGE SCARCE AMONG THE MEXICANS

Mexico City, Nov. 19.—The most persistent phrase encountered by the buying public in Mexico at present is "No hay cambio," "there is no change." The silver in the Mexican pesos, fifty-cent piece and the smaller coins, is worth more than the face value of the coin so this money has been hoarded by many persons and sold for their silver content. The result is that "cambio" or change has disappeared and persons who buy or sell are forced to pay from four to seven per cent for silver pieces from brokers. Most merchants refuse to make small sales if they are forced to give change, as-
