White has arranged for him a vigorous schedule of meetings embracing Roseburg, Sutherlin, Oakland and Riddle.

Mr. Etheridge will leave Roseburg at 11 p. m. Tuesday so as to participate in the final days of the campaign in Portland. He is accompanied on his trip by the Rev. O. W. Taylor, rector of the Grace Memorial parish, Portland, which practically completed its campaign the first day.

John L. Etheridge, of Portland, chairman of the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church in the state, was in the city today, and at 1 o'clock addressed a meeting composed of the workers of St. Luke's.

Reports were given, which were very gratifying to all.

Rev. Taylor, of Grace Memorial, Portland, accompanied Mr. Etheridge and gave a short address on the work, and which was most enthusiastically received by those present.

EGG SUBSTITUTES ARE MOSTLY CAMOUFLAGE

Egg substitutes examined by the Agricultural Chemistry department of the Oregon Agricultural College are made up for the most part of corn starch colored with a yellow dye, like turmeric. One brand is put up in packages containing slightly more than an ounce of flour and a pinch of turmeric. It sells on the market at ten cents a package, which is recommended as going as far as a dozen eggs, if used with flour or corn starch. Analysis shows it to be egg camouflage with a food value of less than two eggs. A dozen eggs supply seven times as much energy, as well as valuable salts. Eggs at 70 cents a dozen are cheaper than the substitute at ten cents a package, which really costs at the rate of \$80 for a 50-pound sack of flour.—Josephine County Farm Bureau News.

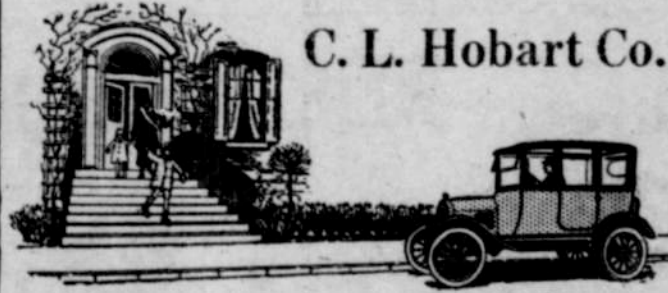
