NOW FOR REAL AMERICAN LEGISLATION

Assertion by Senator Lodge that the peace treaty is a dead issue until the president sees fit to revive it and recede from his stubborn position, is received, for the moment at least, with deep approval on the part of the nation in general, regardless of political affiliation.

Without considering again the merits of the question, even admitting there is much room for argument on both sides, the nation has had a big enough dose, for the time being, of internationalism. The very terms embodied in this particular treaty made the issue one of internationalism, and removed it from

the classification of the ordinary treaty of peace between two warring nations.

Within the nation, problems of paramount importance demand the utmost of which our statesmen are capable. For the first time in the history of the nation the public press openly recognizes the presence of an organized attempt to overthrow the existing government, a nation-wide attempt at revolution and just as complete a revolution as took place in Russia.

It has further been established that this radical element has so insiduously worked itself into control in many labor organizations as to seriously threaten the usefulness and safety of those organizations. This radical movement has been shrewdly, if not wisely, directed, and has affected industry which is semi-public, if not truly public in its nature.

When matters are allowed to go from bad to worse in such public enterprises as transportation and fuel, the radical movement is gaining dangerous momentum, for there is no quicker way to anarchy than the stoppage of the railroads, the non-production of fuel and consequent halt to all industry and serious privation of millions of citizens, from want of both fuel and food.

Another home problem loomed up yesterday when it became known that President Carranza and the Mexican government are giving both moral and pecuniary backing to the J. W. W. revolutionary attempt in the United States. If murder of American citizens is not sufficient to demand action, it would appear now, that the active participation of a supposedly "friendly nation" in a revolutionary attempt against the United States, with the purpose of transferring to Mexican jurisdiction the

states of Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and California, would cause some little "grave concern" in the White House. At least it should cause considerable concern and active measures on the part of congress.

So with the treaty on the table, and congress in a decidedly American frame of mind, the people are watching with hopeful anticipation for the coming business of congress.

254,273 ALIENS ADMITTED

al process during the year numbered 3,968 compared with 1,569 in 1918. The total number of aliens deported, including those refused admission and 34 Chinese deported under the exclusion laws, was 11,728 as against 8,916 in 1918.

The number of admissions to citizenship during the past year was larger than any preceding year, amounting to 217,358, the report said. "Leaving out of consideration the year 1918 this was a far greater number than was admitted in any two years during federal supervision. Military statistics show 128,335 aliens who acquired citizenship after they assumed the uniform of the United States."

The United States employment service at the end of the war had 350 offices with a personnel of 1700 and an administrative force at Washington of 300. During the 11 war months of 1918 the service placed 2,698,887 persons in employment out of a registration of 3,675,858.

Persons directly affected by labor disputes brought to the attention of the department during the year numbered 1,011,968, while the number indirectly affected was 1,336,072. During the year the department assigned commissioners of conciliation to 1,780 cases, including 587 strikes, 1113 disputes and threatened strikes, 63 lockouts and 17 walkouts. Of this 1,229 were adjusted, exclusive of 219 referred to the national war labor board. The commissioners failed to make settlements in 111 cases.

Strong recommendations for the reviving and continuing of the working conditions service, which was instituted during the war to investigate working conditions and to recommend standards for their improvement, were made by the secretary.

He also urged legislation for the continuation of the United States training service. "It is believed," he said, "that increased skill on the part of the workers, and its consequent stimulus towards greater production, is even more important in peace than in war."

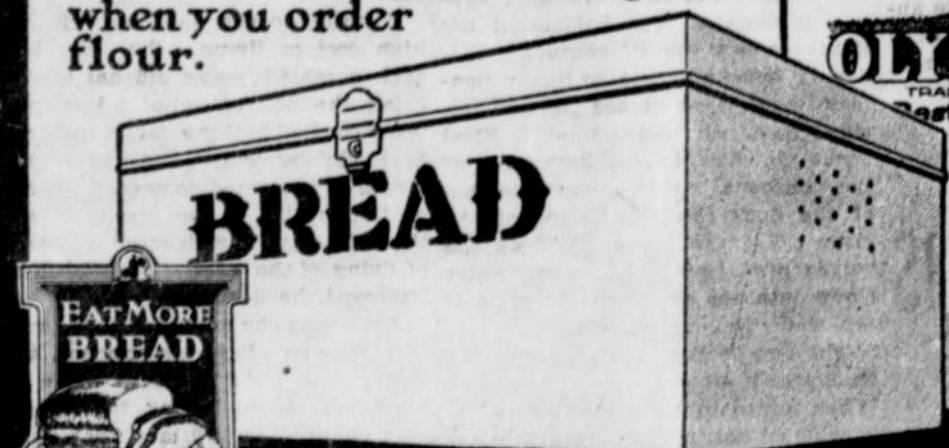
