Enlistments Are Sought—

A party composed of Lieutenant E. B. Jackson, Color Sergeant Wallace, Sergeant Leach and Corporal Formeller arrived in the city last night from Camp Lewis, where they are with the 1st U. S. infantry. They will remain in the city till Monday noon, and will receive applications for enlistments in any branch of the military service of the government. Lieutenant Jackson states that enlistments will be received for either one or three years, and that there are 58 trades now, being taught in

the service which are open to enlisted men.
