Complete Cave Highway Survey—

The survey of the highway to the caves has been completed from the cave entrance to Sucker creek, is the report brought in by a number of boys who had been employed in the work, and who returned to the city this week. They state that the road from the crossing of Sucker creek at the mouth of Grayback will be about 11 miles in length, this being necessary to keep under the maximum grade of 5 per cent. The road comes down Cave creek, along Four-mile creek, and to the Grayback bottom, which it follows down to Sucker creek. There has been considerable snowfall in the mountains, but by starting at the top of and working down the crew was able to get its work completed before the lower country was under too much snow for the setting of the stakes.

M. A. WERTZ DIES AT FAMILY HOME FRIDAY

Marcus Aurelius Wertz, of this city, died Friday morning, December 12, at the family home, 207 West C street, aged 72 years 10 months 7 days, after an illness of several months. Mr. Wertz was born near Chicago February 5, 1847. He came to Oregon in 1868, and the following year was married to Elizabeth Mulkey at Myrtle Creek. In 1891 Mr. Wertz and family came to Josephine county, which has been their home since. Mr. Wertz was for many years prominent in the lumbering industry, operating several saw mills in the Wilderville section. He was also one of the county commissioners of Josephine county for several years. He is survived by his wife and six children, Mrs. Ben Scott of St. Louis, Mo.; Mrs. H. O. Hoard of Mineola, Tex., who has been here for some months; Mrs. Fannie Borchert of Portland; Elmer Wertz of Portland; George and James Wertz of Grants Pass, all of whom, with the exception of Mrs. Scott have been with their father during his last illness and are now here for the funeral.

The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Hall's chapel, with interment at the Granite Hill cemetery. Rev. Henry G. Hanson will conduct the service.
