### Dolls in Literature.

A London writer has recently introduced the subject of dolls in literature. Almost anyone, who will trouble to search his memory, can discover a doll somewhere between the covers of many a book which he has read. Beginning with a "slighting reference to them under the name of babies," in Sydney's "Arcadia," and noting the mention of a doll by Charlotte Bronte, the writer concludes that, until the nineteenth century, dolls were neglected by English authors and that they appear more frequently in French than in English fiction.
