FEDERAL AGENT FINDS INCENDIARY "RED" LETTERS

The office of "Laisve," a Lithuanian radical newspaper was raided by department of justice agents. They found Joseph Walutewicz, business manager of the paper, opening his mail containing checks and money orders. A truck carried away a big load of papers and literature. This telegraphed picture taken at Brooklyn, N. Y., shows Victor Valgavsky, government official, searching the file of the four page paper for incendiary literature.

VICTIM OF SPY FRAMEUP IS SAVED FROM DEATH

Shows Methods of German Espionage Service During the War.

An action brought by a German agent, claiming \$6,000 damages for falsely incriminating him with the French military authorities and nearly getting him shot as spy, which is at present being heard before the Zurich tribunal throws a strange light on the methods and activities of the German espionage service during the war. M. Auguste Fallet, a Swiss tradesman, paid a business visit to Bordeaux in January, 1918. During his absence his mother received a letter from a Herr Jules Holtz of Hamburg, asking her to forward to her son any postcards which arrived for him from Marseilles.

Two unsigned postcards bearing a few ordinary and banal words did arrive from Marseilles shortly afterward, and Mme. Fallet duly sent them on to her son in Bordeaux, whereon M. Fallet was promptly arrested by the French military authorities as a German spy. The censor, it seemed, had discovered important military secrets written on the postcards in invisible ink.

M. Fallet in vain protested his innocence. He was formally tried and sentenced to death. He would undoubtedly have been shot but for a strange coincidence which occurred at Lausanne, where a woman named David was caught in a similar trap by Herr T. Otten of Hamburg, who was known to be in close relations with Holtz.

The Swiss authorities immediately communicated with the French, and on a second trial Fallet was acquitted and returned home.

Mauritius.

Mauritius, the home of the dodo, is in the political limelight, or so it would appear from the announcement that the Bordeaux chamber of commerce has requested the French government to enter into parleyings with Britain with a view to restoring former French supremacy. Since the dodo is extinct, it will be more accurate to speak of Mauritius as once the home of that now almost fabulous creature. Mauritius was once known as Ferne, a name which it is said to have derived from dodos—the dodo, or more unromantically, the ground pigeon. Portuguese, French, Dutch and British have all been connected with the history of Mauritius. It was discovered by the Portuguese. It was French for 100 years and then British. It became British in 1814 but during the French Revolution it had served as a base for many emigrants to whom the Emerald Isle of the Indian ocean was known as the scene of Bernardin de St. Pierre's "Paul et Virginie." It also equals about the eighteenth part of the area of England and Wales.

War Veterans of the Orient and Africa Are Eager for Educated Mates.

Another world demand which the war has rendered greater than the available supply is for educated wives, according to reports from foreign missionaries filed at the New York headquarters of the Interchurch World Movement of North America. The statement says the demand is especially great in the Orient and Africa, where war veterans of the allied armies have had a glimpse of occidental marriage relations and have found them desirable. According to reports from one missionary, a young Moslem sheik offered to trade the four native wives allotted him by the Koran, if the missionary would bring him an educated American girl.

NEWLYWEDS ALSO BARRED

Takes a Bride Five Years to Learn to Care for a House.

Kansas City landlords have sprung a new wrinkle in apartment restrictions. They are barring Mr. and Mrs. Newlywed from their apartments and placing them in the same class with children, dogs and birds.

One landlord declares that it takes a bride about five years to learn to take care of a house and to learn to unwrap every package that comes from the grocery store, including paper on canned goods, under which bugs, roaches and what-not get into a house. They also drive nails into the walls and tacks into the floors, causing much damage.
