The visitors to Manhattan may dine in twenty different languages. There is no danger of a latitudinarian of diet feeling that his style is cramped here. In Paoli street, between Maiden Lane and Wall street, there are six Spanish restaurants where one may procure arroz amarillo. The Syrian in Washington street goes in for manzaleh and the Armenian over in Twenty-third street and Lexington avenue has lamb fries broiled over charcoal, with rice pilaff on the side. Lower Fifth avenue is the home of French cooking. There is a Mexican restaurant in the Nineties on upper Broadway where one may order enchiladas and frijoles. Lower Second avenue is dotted with Yiddish restaurants and the best known English chop house is on Broadway, in the Thirties. Greek and Dutch eating places are on Sixth avenue. And there is a Japanese cafe in an uptown hotel where a fried shrimp is taught how to take a joke. Mott is lined with Chinese restaurants.

## CARDIAC DROPSY TAKES LIFE OF W. O. BENJAMIN

William O. Benjamin, aged 53 years, 5 months and 22 days, died at his residence at 610 Howard street, Monday evening, January 12, after months of suffering from cardiac dropsy.

Mr. Benjamin was born in Harrisburg, Oregon, July 20, 1866. He lived there during his boyhood and young manhood, coming to Josephine county about 12 years ago. He located at Leland, where he was united in marriage to Miss Edith Green. Four children were born, all of whom survive, the family lived in Grants Pass for several years past. Besides the widow and four little ones, Mr. Benjamin leaves an aged father and two brothers and one sister, one brother having lost his life in France during the war.

Funeral services will be held in Hall's chapel Wednesday afternoon, January 14th, at 2 p. m., Rev. Joseph Knotts preaching the sermon. Interment will be at the Granite Hill cemetery.

## BRAZILIAN AIR SERVICE IS SUBJECT OF RIVALRY

Rio de Janeiro, Jan. 13.—There has been rivalry between airplane manufacturers of the United States, France, Great Britain and Italy for the privilege of developing commercial aviation in Brazil. All of them have had representatives here for months endeavoring to interest the government in their projects or to obtain concessions permitting them to operate aerial freight and passenger lines.

The British Handley-Page company has obtained a government concession to establish an air line for passengers and cargo between the principal cities of Brazil but no British machines have yet arrived. It is said that £2,000,000 has been set aside to develop air routes by this concern along the entire coast from Pernambuco to Buenos Aires with stations at eight points on the way. It is stated that powerful machines of the four-motor type capable of carrying a ton of freight and 25 passengers will be used. The British company proposes to operate the lines until Brazilian companies are organized to take over the business and buy the airplanes.

One American company has two expert aviators and four machines here but it is not known that they have done anything other than to give some exhibition flights. Application has been made to the government for permission to establish a limited passenger service in the vicinity of this city.

A representative of a large American financial institution who recently investigated the possibilities of commercial aviation in Brazil said that this country did not at present offer a profitable market for American airplane manufacturers but he added:

"The foreign manufacturer who remains on the ground during the lean years and aids in the development will eventually receive financial reward, and what is more important, he will place the nation he represents in a position of greatest influence in South American aeronautics."
