POLITICAL POT IS BUBBLING

the Courier today. Other names heard in connection with the clerkship, are those of Mrs. Jennie Moss, Jos. A. Wharton and M. L. Opdycke. The office of the county judge has occasioned the greatest comment and discussion of any of the offices. Judge Gillette has stated that it seems like a hopeless thing for a democrat to ask for office this year, and has not definitely announced his candidacy, though his nomination by his party is probable. Upon the republican side there seems no end of excellent available timber, and two announcements are forthcoming today. Assessor Eelus Pollock, who has been keeping tab on the assess-

ment rolls of Josephine county to a time to which the memory of man runeth not, has stated his willingness to serve as county judge if elected, and his name will be before the republicans in May. Arthur S. Coutant, publisher of the Grants Pass Observer, will also be a candidate for the nomination, a move to that end having been put under way by his friends several weeks ago. Don Morrison announced his own candidacy several days ago and the names of various other possible candidates are heard for the judgeship, these including Franklin S. Bramwell, president of the Chamber of Commerce; and E. J. Lind, former county commissioner.

Geo. W. Lewis, sheriff, and Geo. Calhoun, treasurer, will no doubt be candidates for renomination, and no opponents have yet made public announcement of an intention to try conclusions with them in May. Both are republicans. District Attorney Miller, democrat, will likely be renominated by his party should he ask it. No republican has yet announced his candidacy for this office.

County Commissioner McCabe is a holdover, the outgoing member of the board being Commissioner McFadden. At this date Mr. McFadden seems to have the track to himself, no contestant having yet appeared to race with him for the primary election goal.

With the appearance of the first of the definite announcements, it is anticipated that the campaign is now fairly launched, and the string of entries of both republican and democratic possibilities will rapidly increase.
