CLEANLINESS IS OF IMPORTANCE

It Is Proper Attention to Little Things That Adds Years of Service to Car.

LIST OF COMMON TROUBLES

Each Part of Machine Will Operate Better, Wear Longer and Give Less Trouble if It Is Kept Clean and Free From Grit.

What troubles occur most frequently on the road? Let us make a list of the ailments which most frequently afflict the automobile while it is serving our pleasure. This done, we will consider what the careful owner can do to eliminate them as far as possible. If we leave out of consideration skids and collisions, which are either unavoidable or the result of sheer carelessness or negligence, we have the following list of common troubles: Ignition trouble, carburetor trouble, broken rear axle, burnt-out

engine bearings, slipping clutch, stripped transmission gears, universal joint troubles and stripped differential gears. It is quite a formidable list, and nine out of ten owners, whose cars are towed into garages, can charge the resulting expense to one of the above items.

"Cleanliness is next to godliness," but as applied to the automobile, cleanliness comes first and is all-important. Each part of your car will operate better, wear longer and give less trouble if it is kept clean and free from grit. Careful cleaning also involves inspection, for the two go hand in hand. When you clean the dirt out of corners with kerosene and a brush you may discover that an oil pipe which feeds an important bearing is broken; a loose taper pin in the pump or magneto shaft; a missing grease cup and countless other

troubles. Conversely, the driver should be given every opportunity to report any complaints regarding lubrication of the other parts which may be necessary to insure diligence on the part of the inspector. In a small fleet the chief mechanic himself may best be entrusted with this work, otherwise a special man may be detailed. The nature of the work would preclude any elaborate report, so that a manila card with the names of the different oiling points on all the chassis may be prepared with spaces for check marks by the inspector. A simple code, such as C for change, O for lack of oil, D for dirt and R for repair, may be adopted, a simple check serving to show that the part was found in good condition. Naturally, when a man goes over a chassis so minutely as to examine each lubrication point he covers all of the vital portions which are liable to become out of order, so that this inspection is also invaluable in detecting slight derangements which are easily repaired in the incipient stage, but which might go unsuspected in ordinary running until they become so serious as to necessitate a major repair.

First Harvest Festival

The first harvest festival in Britain is supposed to date from the general thanksgiving ordered by Queen Victoria in 1854, but Archdeacon Denison held a harvest festival in his church at East Brent, Somersetshire, in 1843, and the famous poet-preacher, Hawker of Morwenstow, held a similar service in his Cornish parish that same year. The most popular of all harvest festival hymns, too—Dean Alford's "Come ye thankful people, come"—was written some years before the queen's proclamation.

ADAPTED TO SHOPPER'S NEED

Strong Bag That Will Hold a Variety of Purchases, to Be Constructed of Remnants.

Nowadays it is absolutely necessary to take a strong and roomy bag when doing the daily shopping, and our sketch shows a very handy type of bag for this purpose.

It can be carried out with a remnant of thin stair carpet or any other strong material, and can be made in any size to suit different requirements. The diagram on the right of the illustration roughly gives the shape of the piece of material that will be required; it is folded at the point

marked by the dotted line, and sewn together at the sides. The opening of the bag is bound with braid, and just below this a number of eyelets are let in, and through these eyelets a piece of strong blind-cord is threaded, by which the opening may be drawn together, and also by which the bag may be carried.

Sewn on in front of the bag and bound at the edge with tape is a small linen pocket, into which bills may be slipped.

STRAIGHT LINES HOLD SWAY

Good Thing to Remember Now That It Is About Time to Plan for Fall Things.

Interest in summer suits is naturally waning somewhat at the present time, with fall so near at hand, and the woman who is planning a fall suit must bear in mind the fact that regardless of dress silhouette, straight lines hold sway in suits. No matter what material is used or what trimming embellishes it, the smart suit will have a straight, semi-fitted coat, thirty to forty-five inches in length, with narrow shoulders and long, tight sleeves. Suit skirts are shorter than those shown with spring models, and while by no means full they are a trifle wider. Soft velours are very popular and a great deal of fur trimming will be used. This fur trimming is usually only in the form of generous sized collars and revers and sometimes cuffs. Trimmed skirts or the elaborate fur pelisms used on suit coats last season are not in evidence so far. Embroidery and fanciful braiddings appear on many smart suits.

For first fall wear strictly tailored models of cheviot and smart wool mixtures are being brought out.

SASH KEEPS ITS POPULARITY

Far From Passing, It Bids Fair to Become Even More Important Article of Dress.

We keep hearing the rumor that the vest is passe—certainly it is passing, if we judge by the signs of the times, and unless it has a revival will not be here at all by fall. The sash, however, has taken on a new lease of life and is to play an even more important part in our costume than ever before. As to fringe, it is to be more extensively used than ever—in every depth and wherever possible. The fringe banding is often seen trimming satin capes, coats of camels' hair and dresses of taffetas and satin. This banding is made by stitching the fringe on a strip of satin at top and bottom, so that it has the appearance of insertion when used as trimming. Now and then one finds a color different from the dress or cloak showing through the threads, but this is not nearly so often used as the plainer colored banding in blue or black.

Children's Fall Styles.

Mothers are glad to see gimpes coming into fashion again for the little folks. They give a dark dress a "dressed-up" appearance, and are a great saving in the laundry. They are decidedly fashionable this summer and autumn, being made simply and trimmed with either a bit of Val lace or a frill of piping of the sheer white material from which they are made. One mother has made a half dozen of these useful gimpes for her small "tomboy" daughter who is in the second grade at school, deciding that it is easier to wash several gimpes than several whole dresses, since it is the sleeves and collar that are soiled first.

PROUD OF HER FAMOUS SONS

Massachusetts Has Sent Out Many Who Have Done Great Things in the World.

Not to be too insistent and greedy, Massachusetts and her "Old Colony" should always file their claims to the honor of producing men that are doing the new work of the world as well as celebrating forever the Pilgrim Fathers, writes The Listener in the Boston Transcript. It is no accident, no mere coincidence, that both the pioneers of transatlantic air transportation should be Massachusetts men; the first man to navigate an airship from America to England was Commander Read, whose boyhood home was South Hanson, Mass., and the first engineer to carry the big street traffic of New York city under the Hudson river is Clifford M. Holland, born at Somerset, Bristol county thirty-six years ago. Both upper air and subterranean problems have brought laurels to boys of the Old Colony public schools. To be sure, Commander Read's education was completed at Annapolis Naval academy, and Mr. Holland's at Harvard university, where he graduated in 1906. But there must be something in the stock and something in the system which brings it to pass so often that when great things have been done, or great things are to be accomplished, and the door is necessarily forced into the spotlight of the press, and his antecedents are eagerly examined, the little old significant abbreviation, "Mass.," is apt to appear in connection with some little town as his birthplace.
