Chicago, Jan. 27.—New cases of flu reported to the health department today continue to decrease. The death toll however is higher, 173 deaths having been reported today as caused from pneumonia and influenza.

Washington, Jan. 27.—The president nominated Dr. Hugh S. Cumming of Hampton, Virginia, as surgeon general of the public health service to succeed Dr. Rupert Blue, whose term expired January 15.

Florence, Italy, Jan. 26.—During the meeting at which Anarchist Enrico Malatesta, recently elected to the chamber of deputies, urged revolution, the mob tried to overcome a party of carabinieri. Later the carabinieri defended themselves and fired at the demonstrators, wounding a score of them.

Farm Bureau Officers—

Fire Department Report—

A report of the fire department filed in the office of the city auditor shows that there were only three fire calls during the year 1919 of a serious nature, although the department responded to a total of 44 calls. In only three calls of the 18 where the volunteer firemen were called out was it necessary to use water, the chemical engine proving all that was required to control the flames. The department was called in 16 cases of chimney fires and 10 cases of grass fires. The volunteer firemen, who are paid upon the basis of the calls to which they respond, were paid \$177.50 during the year. The report shows that the city has 2050 feet of hose in shape for use.
