Recruiting Station to Move—

The army recruiting station, which has been located in Grants Pass since 1916, has been ordered transferred to Medford, to which place it will move on February 1st. This station covers the counties of Josephine, Jackson, Curry, Klamath and Lake.

Discuss Fishing Regulations—

Messrs. Jos. Wharton, J. N. Johnston, Geo. Bangs and M. L. Odycke were in Medford Thursday evening representing this city at a conference of citizens of the valley who desire better regulation of fishing upon Rogue river. Representatives of Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass were in the conference. It was the opinion that net fishing should be prohibited, commercial fishing on the Rogue to be confined to taking salmon with the troll, such fishing to be allowed upon the entire stream, and salmon legally caught with the troll to be sold in the markets. A committee of attorneys from the three cities was appointed to draft a measure to be initiated embodying this feature. Attorneys Norton and Johnston were named from Grants Pass, while Reames and Thomas are the Medford members, and Judge Briggs was named from Ashland.
