"BLOND ESKIMO" ORIGIN TRACED TO EXPLORERS

Not More Than Dozen of Them in Victoria Land, Says J. R. Crawford.

Atavism explains the discovery of "blond Eskimos" in Victoria Land in the arctic, reported by Vilhjalmur Stefansson, in the opinion of James R. Crawford, a member of the second Stefansson expedition, who has come out of the north for the first time in 15 years.

The blond natives are "throw-backs" of early white explorers, Crawford believes. He expressed surprise that the existence of an entire tribe of blonds was generally believed. He was with Stefansson when the blonds were discovered.

"In Victoria Land," Crawford said, "there are probably three tribes or villages, comprising several hundred natives, in which these light Eskimos are found. But there are fewer than a dozen of the blonds, so far as we were able to learn, in the entire land. They had gray eyes, light eyebrows, reddish brown hair, and their skins are slightly lighter than that of their brothers, although not noticeably so.

"The natives made it known that they had never seen white men before, and probably they had not," Crawford said. "But their ancestors did see white men, probably looking for a new land, who never lived to get back to civilization.

"There was one little girl who possessed the most pronounced markings of blondness, the daughter of two dusky natives whose hair was black and who had black, bendy eyes. The parents knew of no reason for the reddish hair and gray eyes of their offspring."

Crawford, who was married shortly after he had returned to civilization on the steam whaler Herman, which had picked him up on a floe near Victoria Land, intends to take his bride north with him when the ice breaks in the spring.

BOY IS GREAT HUNTER

Fifteen-Year-Old Oregon Youth Holds Record of State.

Blenn A. Brooks, fifteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Brooks of Swiss Home, in the Sluslaw country, in Oregon, claims to be champion bear hunter for his age in that part of the country. His record so far has, perhaps, not been equaled in any part of the state by any lad as young as he.

On August 12 of this year Blenn killed a big bear with one shot, bringing it out of a tree where it was feeding on berries, and on September 12 he killed another in a neighbor's orchard, bringing it down out of a fruit tree with two shots. But the most exciting encounter he has yet had was on November 20, when he and his two older brothers were out hunting in the mountains not far from home. While going through a big patch of fern the boy saw tracks of a bear leading to a hollow tree. When he and his dog neared the tree Bruin came out and with one slap of its paw sent the dog whirling into the air and then climbed a tree.

The boy hunter knocked it out with one shot, whereupon the bear showed fight. Blenn coolly pumped two more doses of lead into the advancing beast and finished it.

BUYS SAFE FOR SUGAR

Pennsylvania Man Takes Drastic Steps to Save Supply.

At last the inevitable has happened. Sugar has become so valuable that thieves would rather have it than diamonds, and Dickerson Run, Pa., is resorting to drastic means to retain it.

Edinburgh Citizens, Not Without Reason, Claim Princes Street Is Superior to Any.

When Edinburgh began to outgrow its streets and run over into the countryside the citizens took the matter in hand and decided to enlarge their city. They started with a drab little street which they built over from the ground up and called it Princes street. From the day its first stone was laid the Scots of Edinburgh determined that Princes street should be the most beautiful street imaginable.

Today Princes street is, to the Scot, the most beautiful street in the world. The stranger from another land struggles to remain true to home at attractions and compromises by pronouncing Princes street one of the most beautiful streets in the world. On one side of the Scottish main street are ranged the best hotels, shops, and clubs in Edinburgh. On the other are terraces and monuments with a frame of trees and grass.

From this street you can see the towers of Edinburgh castle standing out against the sky. Here are statues of Edinburgh's great and garden-where the Scots can take the air without going to the outskirts of the city. Of the statues, the most beautiful is that of Scotland's favorite writer, Sir Walter Scott. An arch decorated with many spires forms a covering for a marble statue of the novelist. About him in corners of the arch are small statues of his greatest characters.

Princes street is beautiful because the Scots have never swerved from their purpose of making it so. Nothing can be added to Princes street, no structure built without the approval of the city.
