CRESCENT CITY IS HOPEFUL

Added encouragement for greater development in this section of the country attaches to the forthcoming meeting of the directors of the C. & O. Lumber Co., to be held in the east. It is a well known fact that these people have been bending every effort towards getting a railroad into this section, and with the eastern demand for soft wood lumber and mill products ever increasing both as to quantity and price, the situation lends itself as an inviting offer for capital.

J. H. Owen, vice president and general manager of the C. & O. mill at Brookings, Ore., departed early this week to meet with the directors. While no announcement was made, current rumors indicate that as soon as the national railroads are returned to private ownership again, construction work on both the coast line and the interior cross country projects will be completed.

With only 79 miles to build on the Crescent City and Grants Pass connecting link, it is possible that the lumber interests will in themselves combine enough capital to get that road under construction.—Crescent City Triplet.
