TOOK TWO CEREMONIES TO UNITE THIS COUPLE

California Bride and Groom the Victims of a Comedy of Errors.

After a night of riding back and forth between two counties, during which time two marriage ceremonies were performed, Osborne Newmon and his bride, formerly Miss Irlie Mae Lee, have planned a more quiet honeymoon at their new home in San Bernardino, Cal.

The double marriage came as a comedy of errors as a result of a courtship that had its inception at the office of a San Bernardino telephone company, where both were employed. The couple decided upon a secret marriage as a surprise to friends. They obtained a license in San Bernardino and then decided to motor to Riverside to be married in order to keep the event secret.

At Riverside they found Rev. Richard E. Day of the Baptist church, who performed the first ceremony. Then they drove back to San Bernardino to complete plans for the honeymoon.

Upon arriving home the newlyweds learned that the ceremony performed by the Reverend Day was not binding because the ceremony had been performed in Riverside county with a license issued in San Bernardino county.

A hurried visit was made to the home of a deputy county clerk, who was aroused with a request for the issuance of a second license. Then came a search for a second minister. But in the meantime the deputy

clerk called Judge Rex B. Goodcell for a legal opinion, and in a drowsy voice the judge declared a second license could not be issued. The almost-weds must make use of the first license.

That made complications worse, for the first license had been left in Riverside with Rev. Day. So back to Riverside sped the couple.

Then came more searching, and finally Rev. Day was awakened. He consented to accompany Newman and his near-bride to the San Bernardino-Riverside county line to perform a second ceremony.

But the hour was late and the difficulty of obtaining the necessary witnesses arose. A "white wing" busily engaged in sweeping the deserted streets of Riverside declined to desert his work. He had no desire to place his job in danger. Finally a pedestrian was located and joined the party as witness.

It was just midnight when the county line was reached, and in the glare of the automobile headlights, Reverend Day, the bridegroom and witness, stood in the dust of a highway and the second ceremony was performed.

GLASS SCARCE IN FRANCE

Oiled Paper is Being Pressed into Use as a Substitute.

Millions of yards of oiled paper are being used in France as a substitute for window glass while the glass works in ten departments, wiped out during the war, are being rebuilt. This observation was made by the correspondent of the Associated Press, who is being made acquainted with reconstruction work through a trip conducted under government auspices.

Work of reclaiming the 33 per cent

of the nation's glass works and ceramic plants which lay in ruins at the end of the war is slow because of the difficulty of replacing the vast mass of copper tubes and the specially designed furnaces employed in the industry. Nevertheless, the manufacturers are resuming operation, furnace by furnace.

Engineering experts estimate that it will be three years before pre-war production can be attained.

BRITISH TRADE HIT HARD

Balance Against Nation in November Greatest Since Armistice.

The adverse balance of trade against Great Britain as shown by comparison of her exports and imports during the month of November was the lowest attained since the armistice.

Its total was £36,200,000 (\$18,575,000,000) at the present rate of exchange.

Britain's exports increased about £9,000,000 (\$3,375,000,000) in November, while in the same period her imports decreased about £10,000,000 (\$3,750,000,000). The decline in imports is attributed by the American chamber of commerce in London in part to the recent strikes in the United States.

It is stated also that decreased production and shipping troubles in America forcibly reduced British imports, but at the same time improved her market for exports in continental Europe, which were shut off from their source of supply.

STOCK LISTED BY COUNTIES

Most Desirable for Communities to Concentrate on Production of Few Breeds.

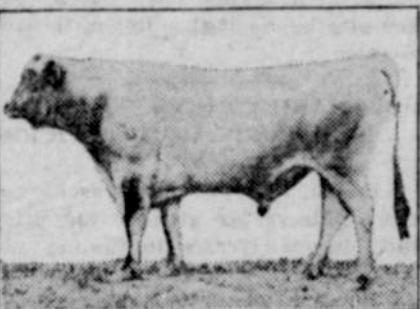

In the nation-wide campaign to promote the general use of purebred sires and better live stock, the United States department of agriculture will keep records of the agricultural counties according to the breeds of live stock which predominate in them. Practical experience has demonstrated the desirability of communities concentrating on the production of only a few breeds and types of the different classes of live stock. Such management not only enables the individual farmers to aid each other in improving and upgrading their stock, but also gains for the communities wide reputations as centers for certain breeds. The raising of several dominant breeds in any community makes that locality the mecca for prospective purchasers who are desirous of buying animals of those breeds, and also makes it possible for buyers to obtain stock in large quantities.

For the service of persons interested in examining or selecting live stock, the department will keep a record of the dominant breeds and varieties of the different kinds of live stock in each county where such information is obtained from accurate and dependable sources. Pending future developments in this work, a breed or variety will be considered dominant if 100 or more good purebred sires of that breed or variety are owned and used for breeding in a county.

Sources of information concerning these farm animals will include county agents, officials of state agricultural colleges, and representatives of state boards of agriculture. The department requests that state and county live stock associations transmit figures and all data available on the purebred sires of their region to their local county agent or the state agricultural college. This material should include a statement of the number of purebred sires in the county, together with the date when the information was gathered. Initiative in collecting and reporting these data rests entirely with the county and state officials.

Information gathered in this way by the department of agriculture will be available to the public. Thus per-

sons wishing to purchase any kind of live stock may ascertain readily what counties in the United States, according to the records, have purebred sires of the various breeds in which they are interested. Naturally where as many as 100 purebred sires are used in a community, these herd headers will stamp their quality to a considerable extent on the live stock of that county and lead to the production of many desirable grade females, as well as purebred stock of both sexes. Furthermore, in counties where a certain breed is considered dominant, even though there are less than 100 purebred sires, such facts should be reported and will be kept as supplementary records.

FEEDING AVERAGE DAIRY COW

Certain Amount of Clover Hay, Corn Silage and Grain Required for Winter Feed.

An average dairy cow that is capable of producing 250 to 300 pounds of butterfat a year, will require a ton of clover hay, three tons of corn silage, and around 1,500 pounds of grain for her winter feed or for the time she is fed indoors. If the hay is of first-class quality and the corn silage has considerable corn, the hay may be increased and the amount of grain decreased.

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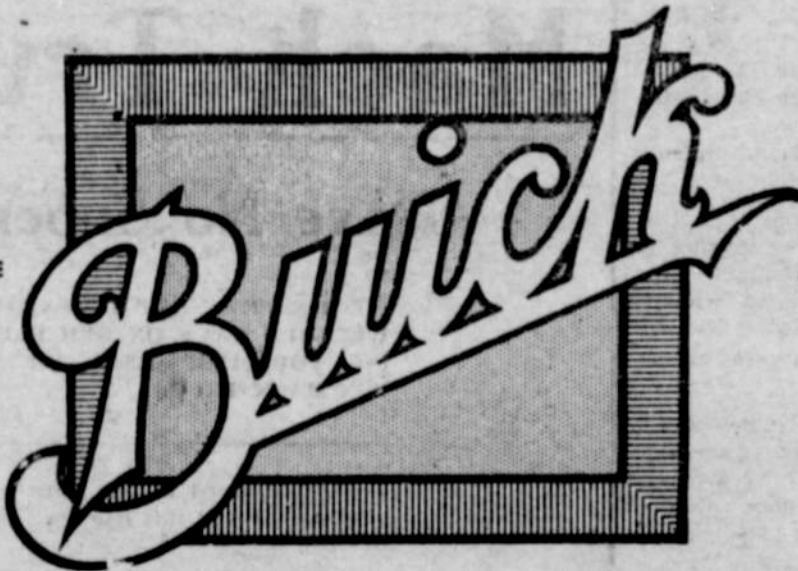
