WILSONIAN PETTISHNESS

The attitude of President Wilson in events, past and present, make us almost forget that America is a country "governed by the people," and not an absolute monarchy where the will of one man is supreme. It is unbelievable that he could question the wisdom of meetings of the cabinet during the days when he was too ill to be troubled with the affairs of state. His condition was such that mentally he could not function as president, and physically a strain might mean his death. Must the business of this great nation stand at arms while Wilson recovers, or shall those who are charged equally with duty meet the emergency by running the nation as best they can? The members of the cabinet were doing only their duty to their country, and Secretary Lansing and his associates should have been commended by Wilson rather than to have been criticised. It only proves that the president is unwilling to accept the counsel of his fellows. His will must be supreme.

The nation sympathizes with Wilson in his misfortune, and wishes him speedy and full recovery. But the nation does not sympathize with such pettishness as he is now manifesting.

THE PROVIDENT DAUGHTER

This is a sort of fairy tale. So it begins:

Once upon a time there lived in the city of Turin, in Italy, a nobleman, kind and generous, whose name was Count Bajnotti. In the course of time the count was gathered to his fathers, and then it was discovered that he had made a most curious provision in his will.

This will set aside a sum of \$10,000 from which the income was to be awarded annually to a girl in the city of Providence, R. I., a different girl to receive the income each year. How was the right one to be selected?

Not for beauty, not by chance. She was to be chosen for her goodness as a daughter. Every year the sum is to be allotted to "that daughter of the common people who shall best deserve it by her conduct and family virtues."
