TO HATCH STEELHEAD FRY FOR THE STREAMS

Henry O'Malley, of Seattle, of the United States bureau of fisheries, and H. C. Mitchell of Clackamas, superintendent of the bureau for the state of Oregon, were in the city today investigating the situation as regards the needs of fry for planting in the Rogue and other streams of this vicinity. The gentlemen stated that the hatchery on the Applegate was ready to turn out all the fry demanded, and would be put into operation to meet the demands here if the rains came so that there was water to supply the hatchery. They said the capacity of the hatchery was such that six millions of steelhead fry could be produced, and that these would be hatched out and liberated in the streams here if the water was high enough before the season for the taking of the spawn was past.
