A COOPERATIVE ENTERPRISE

The organization of an irrigation district project such as that now being brought to a successful issue in Grants Pass and its adjacent territory is purely a community and a cooperative project. There is no element of profit in it for anyone except its owners—the land owners of the district whose finances and enterprises make it possible. No individual or corporation is profiting through the sale of stocks or bonds, for all the money realized from the bond issue goes into the construction of the irrigation system. Once the project is completed, there is no horde of stockholders who will demand rich semi-annual dividends, but water will be furnished at actual cost to the land owners. It is the ideal method of watering the lands of the valley.

There is a wonderful spirit of cooperation upon the part of the people of the district, and with a single exception, the property owners have hailed with delight the coming of the ditches and have offered no objection of the course of the canals through their property. One only has demanded that the funds of the district be used to pay him for right-of-way. All others so far approached have admitted the greater value of their holdings when the ditches with their life-giving flood have come, and have felt that no obstacles to the coming should be erected.

Too high an estimate upon the coming of the water for irrigation can hardly be placed. Lands that have been absolutely valueless so far as production is concerned will become among the most valuable lands in the west. The production of other lands will be vastly increased, and the influence upon the community as a whole will be far reaching, touching every business and industry.

There can be no sympathy with any man who would stand in the way of the absolute success of this community project.
