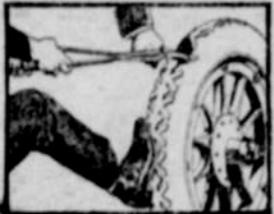

Allen has been acting telegraph editor of the Morning Register of Eugene for the past week, during the flu epidemic in the Willamette city.

Road North Is Rough—

"Any one would be foolish to drive a big car from Medford to Eugene," said Merle Willis who returned last night from Eugene to which city he had driven Will G. Steel in the latter's Chevrolet car. "Outside of several bad places the road is passably fair, but rough. One bad place we encountered was on Smith hill this side of Wolf Creek on which is deep rutted mud, but it can be negotiated with a light car and chains. For a distance of a half mile in the Cow Creek canyon the same condition prevails. Between Yoncolla and Drain there is about 100 yards of deep soft mud in which our car sunk up to the axle. Because of tire troubles it took us 18 hours to make this trip of 188 miles, but exclusive of tire trouble delays we should have made the trip in 14 hours."—Mail-Tribune.
