OREGON WEATHER

MORE LAND FOR THE LAND HUNGRY

The government is soon to open for settlement another 360,000 acres of the forfeited O. & C. railroad lands. This opening will include lands in Southern Oregon, lying to the north of the lands opened a couple of years ago.

Men who served in the late war are to have a prior right of filing upon these lands, former soldiers and sailors to be given a 60-day preference right. The time spent in the service will also be deducted from the three years of time that is required to be spent upon the homestead before final proof can be made.

The lands will be open to entry at 9 o'clock on April 12th to settlers who have resided upon it since 1913. These settlers who have established a right have first chance. Then on May 10 ex-service men may file. On July 10 all lands not taken by the former service men will be open to the general public.

First, he should go to or write to the land office and through a catalogue there learn just what parts of land are to be available for filing.

Second, he should investigate the lands he wishes to settle upon, for it is required in the official application that he swear he knows just what land he is getting. Perhaps it will be difficult for him to choose a nice section of land being without knowledge of the country.

Third, he should make formal application at the land office for a particular piece of land as listed in the land office catalogue. He will be required to pay 50 cents for each acre applied for and in addition a land office filing fee of \$5 if the land he selects in 80 acres or less, or \$10

EARTHQUAKE DRIED UP WATER TANKS IN ALASKA

Anchorage, Alaska, Mar. 6.—A slight earthquake recently dried up the stream which supplied the water tank at Olmes, on the Tanana valley division of the lines operated by the Alaska Engineering Corporation, and the tank had to be removed to another station. Olmes is about 34 miles from Fairbanks. It was believed the quake turned the entire stream into some other channel.

Berlin, Mar. 8.—The city has leased the former royal stables opposite the palace as a public library. These stables figured prominently during the revolutionary street fighting in Berlin as a stronghold of the notorious marine guard and the Spartan troops. The former kaiser's horses, court equipages and motors have been disposed of by auction.

PUEBLO INDIANS HAD IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

Albuquerque, N. M., Mar. 8.—That prehistoric peoples of New Mexico did a good deal of irrigating is indicated by the remains of canals and ditches found in the state, as well as in other parts of the southwest, according to H. F. Robinson, head of the Indian irrigation bureau here.

The remains of 217 miles of ditches built by the Pueblo Indians alone are to be found, and there are evidences of elaborate water systems at the ruins of the Gran Quivira, southeast of Albuquerque, and in the Salt River valley in Arizona. These ditches were all dug by hand, according to Mr. Robinson, and clay banks and beds were constructed where the way led over a sandy plain, while the methods of blasting through rocks was to heat the rocks and crack them with large stones and remove them from the way.

ENGLISH BATHERS MAY NOT SHOW OFF BATHING SUITS

Bournemouth, Eng., Mar. 8.—Bathers at this famous holiday resort will not be allowed to loiter on the sands or bask in the sun during the coming season, for the corporation has drawn up the following new by-laws: When intending to bathe persons are to proceed direct from their bungalows, tents or bathing screens to the water; and after bathing to return direct without loitering on the sands.

London, Mar. 8.—Lloyd George announced in the house of commons that Great Britain had no intention to sell any part of the British West Indies to the United States as part payment of their war debt.

Mouthing Time for Moose.

Moose drop their antlers from December 15 to January 15, as a rule, though a few aged ones may retain these ornaments until February. Old hunters say that they could go out in the woods to certain spots favored by the moose at horn-shedding time, and pick up a hayrack of fine antlers in a forenoon 50 years ago, though they have not been so plentiful of late. The moose antlers will keep for an indefinite period when housed and removed from moisture, but they fall to pieces very fast when left in the woods. Those shed in the winter remain firm until spring, but as soon as warm weather arrives a small borer gets into them and reduces them to a fine powder in a few weeks. Though thousands of antlers are dropped in the forests every winter, few hunters ever find one the next summer.

Castor Oil Honey in Comparison.

In comparatively recent days common angleworms were an important item in the materia medica of superstitious laymen. Sometimes they were to be made into a broth or syrup for internal use, but more generally they were used externally. The familiar recipe was to fill a pint bottle with angle worms, cork and seal it and bury it in the ground for three weeks. At the end of that time the contents of the bottle would be a liniment of marvelous powers for the cure of paralysis. There can be no question of its powers, though its curative properties may be doubted. However, if anything could rouse a paralytic to action it would be such a mess as the bottle was found to contain.
