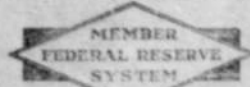

Famous Woman.

The first hand that touched our American Rock of Ages, the boulder that we call Plymouth Rock—was the hand of a woman on December 25, 1620. Well-grounded tradition has it that upon the little Mayflower, nearing the shores of Plymouth, after its fearful voyage, the first of its storm-wrecked company to leap ashore were Miles Standish and Priscilla Mullins, the Puritan maiden. During the appalling hardships of the transit a maiden's love and faith had burned, undimmed, cheering others in despair. Significant indeed that her trembling hand grasped first the rock of America's great future. She has been further immortalized by Longfellow in his "Courtship of Miles Standish."

Use of Plant Foods.

When the pots in which are house plants become full of roots and the soil worn out, or exhausted, a little fertilizer can be given them. The soil should be moist, not dry or very wet, when fertilizer is applied. There are good plant foods sold at large seed stores, of which sufficient can be had for a small price to do for a good sized collection of plants for the whole winter. Or a fertilizer can be made by dissolving half an ounce of nitrate of soda in a gallon of water. About half a teaspoonful of this fertilizer every two weeks for a plant in a six-inch pot will be sufficient. Begonias and coleus must not be given too much fertilizer. Geraniums will bear a larger quantity.
