WOMAN'S DRESS—WHO IS GUILTY?

Dr. Edith Hale Swift, of Boston, made a bitter attack upon the modern woman's dress, at a meeting of women physicians in New York. "The sole purpose of dress of the American woman of today is sex appeal," thundered the doctor. "She does not dress to keep warm, but to attract the attention of men! Her sole thought is to seek the newest, most extravagant styles in the stores, using no thought of hygiene or modesty in making her choice."

Mrs. Beatrice Forbes Robertson Hale took issue with Dr. Swift. She

maintains that "such vanities as are found in the dress and conduct of the American women are due to the desire of the American man to advertise his success in the world through the medium of his wife's possessions." Also Mrs. Hale blames the man-controlled clothing trusts "which give women no choice between frivolity and stark ugliness. These and women's magazines which pose as our friends and advisers are but an insidious profiteering agency to the same end—profits for men who seek to make money by guiding women into the wrong ways."

What both these earnest advocates of simpler styles have failed to see is that their stinging words apply to only the conspicuous few. To be sure, there are women whose dress is more indecent than nudity could ever be. There are also men who prefer that their women should "go gay," believing that it speaks well of the husband's ability as a "provider." But the great majority of American women are plain, sensible, tastefully dressed, well groomed individuals, who try neither their husband's purses nor their neighbor's morals by their immodest attire. And the average American husband would rather see his wife in a white shirt waist and a neat navy-blue skirt any day than in the finest cloth-of-gold costume that ever failed to cover a woman's back.
