PLENTY OF WORK AHEAD

The chief industry in the Grants Pass district during the next few years will be the clearing of land and the making of several stalks of alfalfa to grow where a manzanita bush grew before. The lands are building the irrigation project, and it will be up to the lands to pay the cost. They can do it only by producing, and it follows that they must produce. Next year there will be some eight or nine thousand acres adjacent to Grants Pass with water a plenty to grow any of the crops that can be grown here. As alfalfa is a soil builder, and the easiest crop to put upon irrigated lands, it is likely that there will be a very large percentage of the acres planted to the legume for the first few years. But all who have had experience in clearing lands and in making them ready for irrigation know that the pulling and burning of the manzanita and the chapparal is not the only problem in the subduing of the wild lands. There is a lot of work involved, and every land owner has an engineering problem of his own when the district engineers have brought the water by lateral or pipe to his land. This statement is made as an admonition and a warning. It will take time to prepare for the water, and every land owner should begin now to get ready. He can not afford to wait one day longer than is absolutely necessary to get his land under cultivation. So get out the stump puller and the leveller. There are thousands of acres that must be redeemed from the wild state within the next few months. One result of the coming of the water is already very noticeable. There is a growing demand for land in this vicinity. The large tracts are no doubt going to be cut up, and the holding of large tracts as a matter of speculation will become unpopular. It will be unpopular because it will no longer be profitable. The horse that has been running on practically free pasture is now going to have to be stabled and fed. And to pay for his feed, he will be put at work. It means development and prosperity for every one in the district.

**FRANCE PLACES FIRST ORDER
FOR SHIPS SINCE END OF WAR**

Chester, Pa., Mar. 18.—A ship-building company of this city has received a French order for an 8,000-ton tank steamship. This is believed to be the first order for a ship to be placed by France in this country since the signing of the armistice.

Forefathers' Day.

In 1620 on the eleventh of December by the Julian calendar then in use in England, the "Pilgrims" arrived in the harbor of Plymouth, went ashore and explored the adjacent country. They found open ground, brooks and woods so situated as to be suitable for a settlement and returned to the ship to announce that they had decided to colonize on the coast. When the Gregorian calendar was adopted in England in 1752 the dates between September 2 and 11 were omitted. This brought the date of the landing of the Pilgrim fathers to December 22, which is the day now celebrated as Forefathers' day.

The Budget.
 What is known in politics as "the budget" is that miscellaneous collection of matters which accumulate in the annual financial statement of the minister of finance (or as in Great Britain, the chancellor of the exchequer) to parliament. The budget contains two leading elements, a statement of the income and expenditure for the year that has passed, and the financial standing of the country at the close of the fiscal year, and an explanation of the probable expenditure for the ensuing year, with a scheme for the raising of the moneys necessary to carry on these expenditures.
