OREGON WEATHER

THE O. & C. HOMESTEAD LANDS

The officials of the land office at Roseburg have issued a circular of information concerning the approaching opening of the O. & C. lands in Western Oregon.

The area of lands restored to homestead entry exceed somewhat 350,000 acres. Particular attention, however, is called to the fact that while classified as agricultural under the law, considerable portions of these lands are not adapted to cultivation.

The time when settlers who resided on such lands since December 1, 1913, must exercise their preference rights of entry begins 9 o'clock a. m., April 12, and ends 4:30 p. m., May 8, 1920.

Persons qualified under the general homestead law who performed military or naval service during the war with Germany and who were honorably separated or discharged from such service, or were placed in the regular army or naval reserve, are given a preference right of 60 days within which to make homestead entry on said lands.

DRY GOODS DEPT.

Persons entitled to preference right by reason of service in the late war include honorably discharged officers, soldiers, sailors and marines—privates, seamen, nurses, and all other persons, male or female, who by enlistment or otherwise were regularly enrolled in the army, navy or marine corps of the United States, and who could not voluntarily terminate such service.

Persons not applied for or entered by preference right settlers, or by those entitled to preference right by reason of service will be subject to entry under the general provisions of the homestead law as modified by act of June 9, 1916, on and after July 9, may be filed on and after July 1st, 1920.

Lands not applied for or entered by preference right settlers, or by those entitled to preference right by reason of service will be subject to entry under the general provisions of the homestead law as modified by act of June 9, 1916, on and after July 9, may be filed on and after July 1st, 1920.

The greater portion of the land is situated in the Roseburg, Oregon, land district. Small portions are in the Lakeview and Portland, Oregon, and Vancouver, Washington, land districts.

A booklet containing regulations, schedule of the lands, and full details regarding the opening is now being published. Persons wishing the full information on the opening should write the land office (Roseburg) and request that their name be placed upon the mailing list for the booklet and such other information as may later be mailed out.

Letters of inquiry are too numerous at this time to attempt answer. All such letters are being placed on file for a copy of the booklet, to be mailed when issued.

Paris, Mar. 22.—Eight thousand persons have been killed since the German revolt began on March 13th, according to advices received here.

WASHINGTON WILL RATIFY SUFFRAGE

Olympia, Wash., Mar. 22.—Ratification of the proposed suffrage amendment to the federal constitution probably will be one of the first acts to be completed at the special session of the Washington legislature which convened here today.

Legislators and other state officials said they believed there will be very little, if any, opposition to the ratification. Washington was one of the first states to vote suffrage to women and the last legislature petitioned congress to submit the question of ratification to the states.

In addition to action on the amendment, the special session of the legislature will also vote funds for the state's educational institutions. Money voted by the last regular session has not been enough, on account of rising prices, to carry the schools over until the next regular session.

Governor L. F. Hart hopes the special session will require only about two days to complete its work. The session probably will occupy only two days, it is said, if a flood of bills does not come in.
