Beware of Pets.

A series of experiments has convinced one of the professors of Upsala university that the danger to the community through the dissemination of disease germs by animal pets is serious. In one case a whole family was afflicted with tuberculosis through a pet cat. A Professor Petit in France voices the danger by appealing to owners of pets to take special precautions with animals whose health is not good. Diphtheria is more easily circulated by the feline tribe than any other disease.

Camouflage Would Save Ship.

A submarine can spot a ship five miles away, estimate its course, submerge and later intercept it. But this ship might have a keel painted fifty feet down its side and the actual keel blocked out. This would give it the appearance of traveling in a course that was quite off the actual course. The calculations of the submarine would be quite wrong and the ship would not be intercepted at all.
