"BARBARY COAST" TAME

Notorious San Francisco Region Is Now Quiet.

Those who may come to San Francisco at the time of the Democratic convention the latter part of June with the idea of experiencing a thrill by visiting the "Barbary Coast" will be disappointed.

Many of the resorts, celebrated in story and verse, where cheap boarding house operators, commonly known as "crimps," freely plied their trade of shanghaiing sailors for unscrupulous sea captains, are permanently closed.

Others have but the name of the places that once flamed with color, music and revelry.

Long before national prohibition was generally considered a possibility, "Barbary Coast," a section of Pacific street extending back from the bay front a half dozen blocks to where Chinatown touches the Italian district, had been rendered innocuous by the prohibition of the sale of liquor in the long row of dance halls there.

The main artery from this district to Market street, San Francisco's principal thoroughfare, is Kearney street, where once, it is declared, within an hour enough reckless spirits could be picked up to start almost any sort of desperate enterprise.

Now Kearney is one of the quietest and most respectable business streets.

DEER "CHUMS" WITH COWS AND SHEEP

Eight Point Buck Can Be Seen Grazing on Farm in New York.

Many are the interesting idiosyncrasies of wild life met with by the Conservation Commission's field force as a result of the many hours spent in the open. Unusual or noteworthy occurrences are thus constantly being brought to the attention of the commission. An oddity of this kind which was of particular interest was recently reported by D. W. Rose, a game protector of Richfield Springs, Otsego county, who told of a handsome eight point buck that could be seen almost any day grazing in company with cows and sheep on a certain farm in his territory.

Accounts are not uncommon of deer which in the stress of winter have entered barn yards and there satisfied the pangs of hunger. But a deer which in summer when food is abundant, has so far departed from its natural instincts of seclusion and self-obliviation as to "chum up" with farm animals and graze in an open pasture was surely worthy of record.

The services of the camera man were therefore requisitioned, and both still pictures and movies of the unusual deer were secured. The star actor behaved beautifully, from a photographer's standpoint—was found just where he was looked for, had no objection to the brightest sunlight, and went through all his paces in the most approved manner.

Of course, being a wild deer, he had to be approached with the utmost caution. Every photograph of him that was obtained shows his head raised in instinctive suspicion, while his lethargic companions are unconcernedly munching the grass. The best picture of him was made by stalking up behind a feeding cow and waiting, with camera all set, until the cow grazed out of range, when a snap shot of the deer and some of his associates was secured before he realized that a stranger was in their midst.

The most natural explanation of the unusual behavior of this buck is that being unable to find the companionship of his own kind, he took the best substitute in the only other "big game" that was available.
