SENATE APPROVES INCREASE IN NAVAL AVIATION FUNDS

Washington, Apr. 27.—Committee increases of nearly \$10,000,000 in funds for naval aviation, were approved today by the senate, when the naval appropriation measure was taken up. The senate committee increased the fund to \$25,000,000.

Thomas Leith
Thomas Leith was born October 7, 1844, in the Orkney Island, Scotland. He came to the United States as a young man and settled in Michigan.
